## Littering Fines

Waste & Bin Safety 

Yalgoo residents are reminded to ensure all rubbish is properly secured at all times.

Rubbish blowing into the streets from properties on a regular basis may result in littering fines being issued. We kindly ask everyone to take extra care when placing bins out by ensuring lids are closed properly and bins are positioned securely. These small steps help keep our community clean, safe, and enjoyable for everyone.

If you are experiencing issues with dogs tipping over bins, or if you witness this happening, please report the matter to the Yalgoo Shire Office. Providing photos or video footage of the dog involved will assist in responding to and addressing the issue more effectively.

Thank you for your cooperation and support in keeping Yalgoo tidy.

## For All Dog Owners



Reminder to local residents and new comers to Yalgoo

The Shire of Yalgoo is issuing FINES of over \$200 dollars for every dog being in a public place without a leash.

Please exercise your dogs at the racecourse or oval and ensure you clean up after them.



### Fact Sheet – Laws for Dog Owners

This document provides a summary of the legislation which applies to dogs and the dog owners.

#### What does the Dog Act cover?

The Act addresses the registration of dogs, the keeping of dogs in the community and the legal obligations of dog owners.

The Act applies to all canines. This includes dingoes and dog/dingo crossbreeds.

#### Who enforces the Act?

The Act is enforced by local governments within their respective districts.

If you are aggrieved by a local government's application of the Act, you may be entitled to have that decision reviewed in the State Administrative Tribunal.

#### Why do these obligations apply?

Everyone who owns a dog has a responsibility to ensure that the dog is properly cared for. In addition, it is important that dog owners handle their animals in a way that respects other people in the community.

#### Legal responsibilities for dog owners:

##### Dog control - Penalty: \$200 to \$5000

If you own a dog, you have a legal responsibility to keep the animal under control, either within a fenced area on your property or on a leash when in public.

Local governments can set out dog exercise areas where dogs can be taken off a lead without penalty. Please contact your local government for further details on the exercise areas in your district.

##### Barking dogs - Penalty: \$200 to \$5000

While dogs are allowed to bark, they are not allowed to bark excessively in a way that causes a nuisance.

##### Dog droppings - Penalty: \$50 to \$5000

Dog droppings are a source of annoyance to the users of footpaths and public recreation areas.

Most local governments have local laws in place that require a dog owner to remove their dog's droppings if the dog excretes in a public area. The penalty for failing to do this will vary between districts.

##### Dog attacks - Penalty: \$3000 to \$20,000

A dog attack is a very serious matter. In addition to harming other animals, a violent dog can inflict serious injury on children or the elderly.

If your dog attacks a person or another animal, you can be held responsible even if you are not there at the time. If the dog causes serious injury to someone, you may even receive a jail sentence.

##### Dog registration - Penalty: \$200

A dog owner is legally required to register the dog with the appropriate local government once the dog is 3 months or older.

To register your dog, contact your local government for a registration form and a list of applicable fees.

##### Registration tags - Penalty: \$200

A registered dog is required to wear a collar with a valid registration tag. This tag will be issued by your local government when you pay your registration fee.

##### Microchipping - Penalty: \$200 to \$5000

All dogs must be microchipped once they reach 3 months of age.

Non-microchipped dogs cannot be sold or transferred to a new owner. This rule applies even if the dog is under 3 months of age.

Dogs may be exempt from receiving a microchip if they cannot receive one due to medical grounds. In those situations, the owner will need to obtain a medical exemption certificate from a registered vet.

##### Dangerous dogs

The Act has specific obligations which apply to:

- restricted breed dogs.
- commercial security dogs.
- dogs who have previously committed a dog attack.

In many cases, the penalty issued for an offence under the Act will be doubled if a dangerous dog is involved. Dangerous dogs also have specific requirements regarding collars, muzzling and general confinement.

The dangerous dog fact sheets on the department's website set out this information in further detail.

##### Dog Local Laws

Each local government can introduce local laws on a range of matters, including the number of dogs which can be kept on the premises.

For further information on your local laws, please contact your local government.

If you wish to inspect your district's dog local law, a copy can be freely accessed on the department's local law register.

##### Review of decisions

Dog owners have a right to seek a review of certain decisions made under the Act, if the owner believes the decision was incorrect.

These decisions can be internally reviewed by the local government or they can be appealed in the State Administrative Tribunal.

This right of appeal applies to:

- a decision on whether excess dogs may be kept on the premises.
- a local government's refusal to register your dog.
- an order declaring that your dog is dangerous.
- the seizure of your dog.
- a dog destruction order.

If you wish to have one of these decisions reviewed, you should notify the local government as soon as possible and consider obtaining legal advice.

Work continues on the Yalgoo–North Road, with recent Tropical Cyclones and heavy rainfall providing a significant test of the reconstructed section. Pleasingly, the road has held up extremely well. Investing in mitigation and resilience works such as these will deliver long-term savings for both ratepayers and taxpayers by reducing future maintenance and recovery costs.

The Shire is also back on track with its audit program and is meeting all required timeframes. The 2022/23, 2023/24 and 2024/25 audits have recently been completed and demonstrate the organisation’s commitment to continuous improvement and sound governance. The interim audit for the current financial year has also been finalised, and we look forward to completing the final audit before Christmas.

The Shire recently received positive news from the Wardens Court, with an objection to the demolition of Jokers Tunnel successfully dismissed. While State Government departments have determined that the site does not warrant State Heritage protection, the Shire is continuing to investigate additional measures to safeguard this important local feature for future generations.

The Shire President, Chief Executive Officer and Works Manager recently attended the WALGA Emergency Management Forum, where discussions focused on disaster preparedness, response and recovery, as well as emerging challenges facing regional communities.

Later this month, a delegation from the Shire will travel to Canberra to attend the National General Assembly of the Australian Local Government Association. The delegation will also advocate for improvements to disaster recovery processes to ensure regional communities receive timely and effective support following natural disasters.

Residents are encouraged to contact the Nursing Post and register their interest in receiving a flu vaccination. At present, flu vaccination clinics have not yet been organised for Yalgoo, and demonstrating community demand will assist health providers in planning and delivering this important service. Seasonal influenza can have a significant impact on individuals and the broader community, particularly during the winter months. By expressing your interest now, you can help ensure adequate arrangements are made to provide vaccinations locally. If you would like to receive a flu shot this season, please contact the Nursing Post and make your interest known.

Finally, congratulations are extended to former Councillor and Deputy Shire President, Mr Robert Gillam, who was appointed a Member of the Order of Australia in the recent King’s Birthday Honours. This prestigious recognition reflects his longstanding contribution to local government, industry and the broader community.

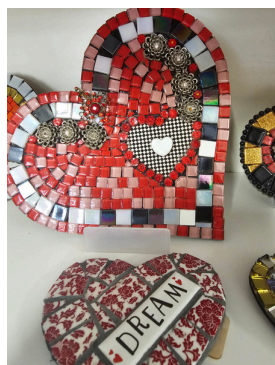

## Exciting Learning Projects Underway at Yalgoo Primary School

### Two-Way Science, Art and History Excursion

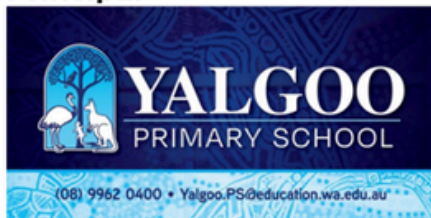

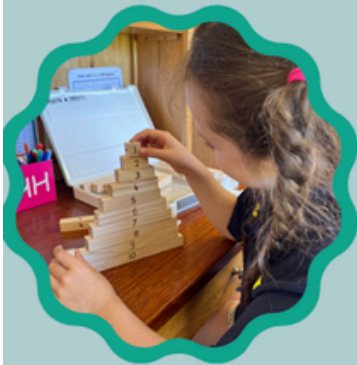

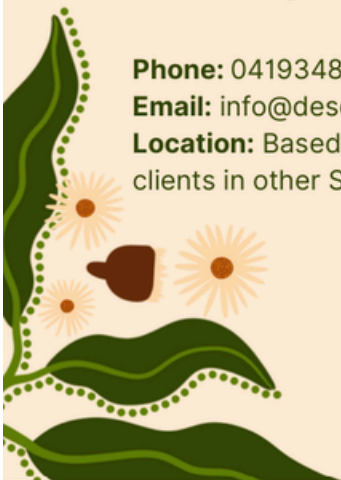

The Australasian Bat Society (ABS) is writing to you with news of a resource for Councils who may be contacted by residents who have, unexpectedly, found a bat (or bats) inside their home. Many councils and land managers have also discovered bats roosting inside government managed buildings, and can directly benefit from these guidelines. Following these guidelines helps keep the public safe

It is not only in rural and remote areas that bats may find themselves inside, also unexpectedly, someone else's home.

So whether you are a City, Municipal or City Council, this resource is something you and your staff will find useful.

Here are some example questions (and a summary of the answer) the resource can help you with:

## **There's a bat inside my house. What should I do?**

There's no need to panic. As soon as you see a bat inside:

- Close any doors to other rooms to confine the bat to a single room.
- Turn off any overhead fans.
- Remove pets and/or children from the area. This makes it much easier to deal with and reduces stress for you and the bat.
- What should I do?

## **I've found a bat trapped in a jar/vase/bucket/sink/light fitting or similar container. What should I do?**

First, try to assess whether the bat is trapped or simply roosting temporarily. If you are unsure, it is safest to contact a wildlife rescue group, bat carer or bat expert for advice as soon as possible. While waiting for advice:

- Keep the bat somewhere quiet, cool, and undisturbed.
- Keep pets and people away.
- Do not handle the bat with bare hands.

## **Do bat colonies cause structural damage?**

Bats are not rodents, and do not nibble or gnaw wood or wires, and will not generally cause any structural damage. However, bat urine has high concentrations of uric acid, which corrodes metal and in high volumes can rot timber and stain ceilings

## What we're trying to prevent

- A chocolate wattled bat maternity roost inside a bridge being destroyed and replaced with unmonitored bat boxes. A bridge with a large footed myotis maternity colony underwent repair work without relocating bats in advance - and dozens of bats were injured, killed or displaced, and expensive construction work was delayed while wildlife carers and ecologists were called. If the department coordinating the infrastructure repair had kept records of known microbat roosts, or noticed the large amount of bat droppings and audible squeaking sounds of the large colony during site visits, they could have been relocated by a qualified specialist, saving significant money, time, and preventing unnecessary mortality.
- A 'good news' story, of a 'successful relocation' of a Southern forest bat maternity colony, which turned out to be carried out without permits, where mothers were literally giving birth as they were evicted into an artificial roost that didn't resemble their original one. Unsurprisingly, the colony didn't survive.
- A white striped freetail bat maternity roost torn open during maternity season. Around 300 bats were suddenly exposed - pups too young to fly, mothers returning in distress, some bats trapped inside after the roof was sealed with expanding foam, leading to a mass mortality event.

Most people want advice, or reassurance, or simply to avoid making things worse. But without clear initial guidance, avoiding damage becomes difficult, often leading to dead pups, displaced colonies, and the loss of critical roosting habitat.

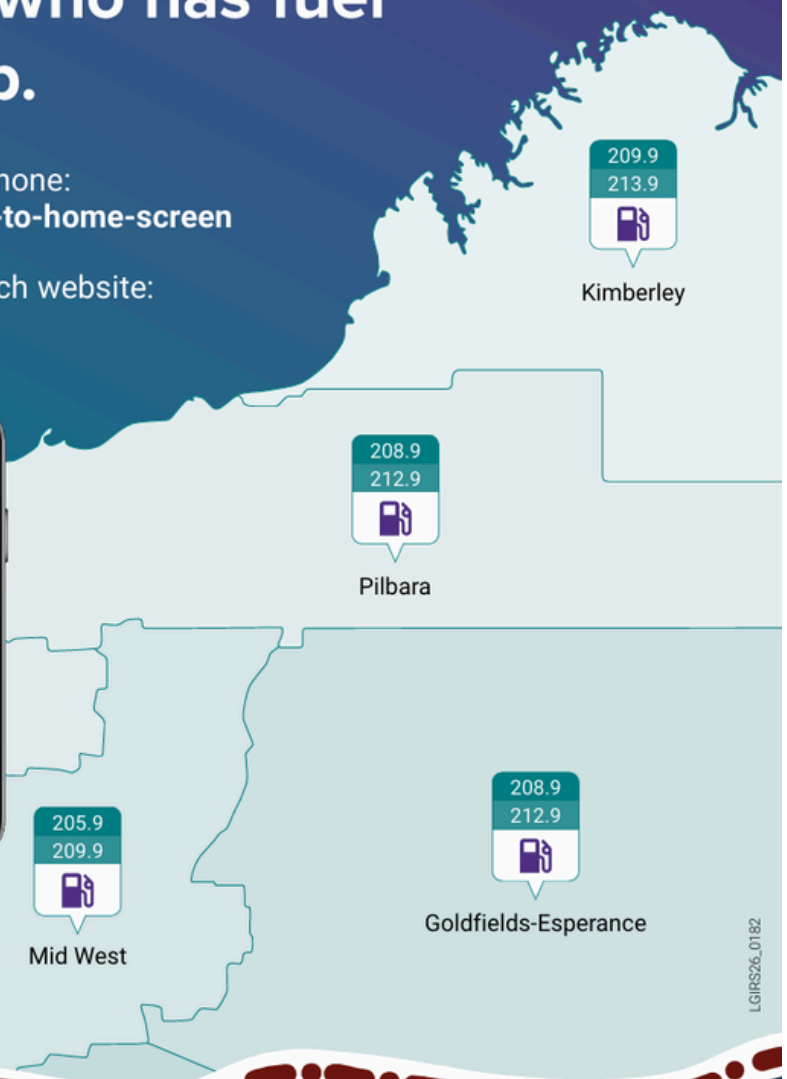

## Helping Mob get the best price on fuel.

Fuel prices are causing stress for many people. We know fuel is important for your community. If you are worried about fuel costs, there are ways to help. One of them is FuelWatch.

From 1 May, the WA Government's free FuelWatch service will expand to regional communities.

### What is FuelWatch?

- FuelWatch is a free service from the WA Government.
- It shows fuel prices so people can compare prices and choose the best place to fill up.
- Fuel retailers must tell FuelWatch their next day's price by 2pm.
- That price must stay the same for 24 hours from 6am the next day.

### How does this affect Community?

- Fuel retailers in remote and regional Aboriginal communities will join FuelWatch from 1 May.
- We understand this is a big change. The WA Government will support retailers as they move to the new system.
- We ask for your help to share this information with community members.

### How can people use FuelWatch?

- Use the ServiceWA app on your phone.
- Use the interactive map to compare fuel prices near you. The cheapest price is highlighted to make it easy to find.
- Sign up for email alerts to receive fuel prices in your area.
- If you do not have internet access, call Consumer Protection on 1300 30 40 54 during business hours for daily prices.

### If a fuel retailer is not following the rules

Fuel retailers must sell fuel at the price they have put on FuelWatch. If they do not, they may receive a warning, \$4,000 fine or court action.

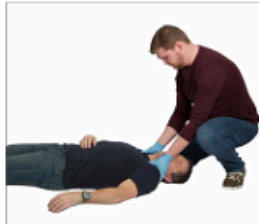

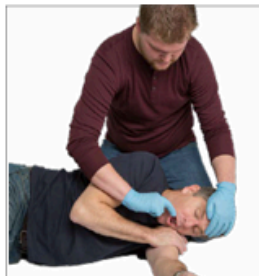
# DRSABCD action plan



**Danger** Check for danger and ensure the area is safe for yourself, bystanders and the patient.



**Response** Check for a response: ask name and squeeze shoulders. **NO RESPONSE?** Send for help. **RESPONSE?** Make comfortable; monitor breathing and response; manage severe bleeding and then other injuries.



**Send for help** Call **Triple Zero (000)** for an ambulance or ask a bystander to make the call. Stay on the line. [If you are alone with the patient and you have to leave to call for help, first turn the patient into the recovery position before leaving.]



**Airway** Open the patient's mouth and check for foreign material. **FOREIGN MATERIAL?** Roll the patient onto their side and clear the airway. **NO FOREIGN MATERIAL?** Leave the patient in the position found, and open the airway by tilting the head back with a chin lift.



**Breathing** Check for breathing Look, listen and feel for 10 seconds. **NOT NORMAL BREATHING?** Ensure an ambulance has been called and start CPR. **NORMAL BREATHING?** Place in the recovery position and monitor breathing.



**CPR** Start CPR: 30 chest compressions followed by 2 breaths. Continue CPR until help arrives, the patient starts breathing, or you are physically unable to continue.

**Defibrillate** Apply a defibrillator as soon as possible and follow the voice prompts.

**DRSABCD** Danger ► Response ► Send for help ► Airway ► Breathing ► CPR ► Defibrillation
